FINANCE

We can all agree that this past year has been like nothing we have experienced before. Our church and church life has had to be flexible and adapt to the changes that Covid has brought to our lives.

Your faithful giving to First Presbyterian Church of Ukiah is incredible. It has allowed us to share the love of Jesus Christ and continue to be a light for Him in our community and the world.

When we started out in 2020 the budget projected we would need to use \$45,000 of our reserves to meet our anticipated expenses. We have been blessed and ended the year with a surplus. We did not need to go into our reserves.

> Income: \$277,169 Expenses: \$275,270 **Surplus: \$1,899**

We also had a substantial increase in designated funds. This included the sale of the Ramos property for \$52K and an additional \$34K for various missions and programs. Session approved spending over \$27K of these funds for our missions and programs during 2020. Session is also discussing how to utilize these designated funds including upgrading the livestream equipment.

Again, thank you for your continuing and faithful giving. Our checking account balance is over \$200K and our savings is at \$127K.

The Youth and Families Ministry activities for 2020 can be summed up in one word: CHANGE. The year started out normal enough. Programs and activities were continuing on from the previous year. Plans were in place to begin Spring with our Annual Easter Egg Hunt and...COVID-19! Our world just got turned upside down and sideways. All the things we count on as a church family were suddenly placed on a giant" HOLD IT RIGHT THERE, DON'T MOVE, DON'T MEET, DON'T GO OUT"!!!

We <u>began</u> to get a very personal understanding for the definition of the word "pandemic". The information and guidance being sent out locally and nationally seemed to be in a constant state of flux. "Treading water" seemed be a good strategy.

Lots of prayers were sent to God asking for wisdom and understanding. Each of us in the FPCU family have stories to tell. It quickly became important to learn more about internet tools like ZOOM and Facetime. Face masks, disinfectant wipes and social distance became very important. Developing a LIVE STREAM presence for our worship service and creating a comfortable outdoor worship and youth group meeting venue became a key focus for staff and volunteers. We have succeeded quite nicely in this work.

Youth and Families Director Alexis Moore led our youth gatherings via ZOOM for most of the summer. ZOOM allowed us to establish connections with our local kids and with several from far away in Arkansas and Arizona. We even had a connection with one student while his family was traveling down the Interstate! Of course, she continued other social media contacts, emails and the like.

More change was on the horizon. We received word from Alexis she would be leaving FPCU at the end of September, in preparation for the next chapter in her life. We now know she will be relocating to the Eugene, Oregon area in early 2021. Alexis is such a treasure to all who know her. Her leaving was so bittersweet. We know God is leading her for His purposes, and this is the sweet. We know she is finished here, for now, and that's not so sweet. I often referred to her as "Sonshine". A worthy description for this wonderful woman.

In late September, Session made an offer of employment to Katherine Schoen for the vacant Youth and Families Director position. She started work effective October 1. She brings an impressive skill set, a breadth of experience in ministry and is an ordained pastor. She gave her first FPCU sermon on October 18. God has blessed our congregation once again!

Pastor Katherine's first significant community outreach event was the Halloween Trunk or Treat Event the evening of October 31. The properly social distanced and masked event saw a steady stream of kids stop by seven brightly decorated "treat stations" to receive a candy treat that popped out of a six-foot long plastic pipe shoot. At least 540 children and adults attended. 120 church information flyers were distributed to adults. We saw a large number of church members participate in the planning, set-up and performance of this event.

October 21 saw the restart of our youth group activities. We have had to make a number of adjustments in order to remain safe in Covid-19 times. The breezeway area has been modified to allow safe outdoor gatherings. Typically, we are seeing an average of six young people in attendance. We have seen ten or more a time or two. We are presenting Bible study in story telling form. This is proving successful in holding the attention of younger members. Those charged with doing the stories are gaining much new knowledge about the characters in their stories! Our Youth and Family Ministry efforts have been blessed, not only with the addition of Pastor Katherine but also her family. Husband Mike plays guitar and leads singing, daughter Anna jumps right in with the teenagers, and sons Jonny and Kristian add their musical and singing talents to the cause when they are home on college break. We are blessed to this have Godly family as partners in our work to share His good news.

We are sure many in our church family are happy to see 2020 leave us. As we look forward to 2021, we see it as a time to plan and prepare for gathering on-site as well as support families during the current "shelter in place."

What a year it has been! If 2020 taught us one thing it is how to adapt to change and our church has had to adapt with it (i.e., Zoom bible studies and livestreaming of church services). This was the 2nd year that the Communications Committee was active and we had our share of changes as well. We continued to run a number of articles and/or announcements in the Ukiah Daily Journal advertising FPCU events in an effort to have families attend that might be interested. Our former Elder, Alexis Moore, left to explore the next steps in her life in September and our new Elder, Rev. Katherine Schoen started in the Fall as Director of Family and Student Ministries.

Although some church members may remember the vignette of the persistence and patience of my mother, it is an encouraging message to share with the congregation in this report. My parents bought a house on five acres of very irregular terrain. Whenever my mother planted new vegetation, she would carefully preserve the clumps of soil and plant them in the dips in the yard. I confess my mild amusement and skepticism at her relocating the dirt (I would gladly assist in the process). In about five years she had very effectively smoothed out the terrain.

The analogy fits our circumstances, COVID has caused a very rough landscape for our community yet patiently in steps we are smoothing the dips in our community life. The generosity of one family enabled us to transition from a small computer camera on a tripod aided by photo lights to a three camera with lights system feeding into a Sling Studio unit supporting multimedia. Alexis had set up our Zoom and YouTube accounts and Perry handled the details of broadcasting on YouTube.

For Mother's Day and Father's Day gift packets were assembled distributing them by curbside pick up. For Mother's Day we had our in house Cookie Professional, Daniel Rodriguez, overseeing the cookie making. Alexis and Roe adapted the Youth ministries to the changed conditions. Out worship team also adapted to the changed conditions so that music remained a part of our worship.

The DeVries family treated us to a full meal after church filling our Potluck void. Our Missions fundraising dinner cook team also maintained our traditional fundraising meal. The Halloween Trunk or Treat was lead by the Schoen family creating the beautiful balloon arches and making the candy refill runs. Though we could not host our usual Community Sing celebration, Denise and Katherine headed up our alternative Outdoors Sing Celebration.

Our Bible studies, Women's and Men's continued by Zoom meetings. Church workdays still continued adapted for the circumstances.

As we reflect back on the events of 2020, we sustained a lot of our activities in spite of COVID. This Congregational Life report closes with the quote from Tiny Tim from the Christmas Carol "God bless us each and every one."

To say that missions was difficult this year, is an understatement. However, we were all in this together and faced the same challenges with COVID-19 and all the restrictions.

Our missions team stuck together and like clockwork met every month, albeit on "Zoom" trying to find a glimmer of need that we could do to fulfill our calling. "To bring the knowledge of Jesus Christ by identifying and supporting worthy projects both locally and globally"

In doing so this year our outreach was pared down somewhat, this also meant our budget would be adjusted too. Staying within our budget was more doable as there was no missions trip to plan for, however it's still something we are looking at for next year.

Working within our Covid guidelines, our fundraising was streamlined to "meals to go" with the same service model of curbside pickup, now more popular than ever, given many of the local eateries were using the same "drive up process". While the results were not as profitable as in the past, it was a great way to outreach into our community and let them know we were still here and ready to serve and at the same time make a little money for our programs.

While programs slimmed down a bit this year, we still were able to do the following;

- with all of the church member donations and the help of our military troops we continued to support to the Caritas Orphanage in Djibouti. A special thanks to Wilma and Shirley who together sent over a number of care packages throughout the year.
- We also continued to support our Presbytery.
- Cents-Ability offerings- Feeding the hungry in our area.
- Pastor John in Uganda- Partnering with others we were able to provide funding for the purchase of a piece of land next to his. This was a big opportunity for his mission as he will use the land to grow crops that will feed the family and the orphans he cares for. This was a real answer to prayer too.

Yes, it was a different year, however God has sustained us all, it is in his presence that we know we are at the right place. With our team, we will be focused on what God has for us in 2021.

January - Several members of the First Presbyterian Church of Ukiah, who faithfully and joyfully serve behind the scenes, braved the experience of leading the call to worship, prayer of confession, scriptural readings, and serving Communion alongside seasoned liturgical leaders. Alexis Moore and George Phelan assisted Pastor David Rodriguez with sermons. We sang praises of (foreshadowing?) songs like, "Endless Hallelujah," and "You Never Let Go." The new year looked promising, and despite the way we view 2020 in hindsight, whether with sorrow or laughter, the assurances of God's love found us in new ways.

February - Ariel Mink assisted Pastor David with sermons. Following a mission trip to Africa, Shelly & Kevin Mack gave a presentation to show how God is working internationally, and provoking conversation about what our next steps may be in continuing that mission of love. Ash Wednesday began our journey of experimentations in worship, as a response to (dramatically foreboding music.....dun-dun-dunnnn) COVID-19. We had questions like, "How to serve communion during a pandemic?"

March - Suddenly, our world flourished with the commotion of COVID-19. Plans to visit family, friends, weddings, funerals, doctor appointments, attend school, and yes, even church services such as Easter, were indefinitely put on hold. Worship, however, doesn't get sidelined just because of technical difficulties. Pastor David made it his mission to ensure that our services as a church would continue to be available to the community. If you can't come to church, church will come to you. Youtube and Zoom became our church's method of engaging in "Live Stream" worship services and Bible studies. Denise Beckler continued to fill our lives with healing music, such as this song:

Come, now is the time to worship Come, now is the time to give your heart Come, just as you are to worship Come, just as you are before your God

April through August kept the worship teams quite busy as they learned how to get the most out of the facilities and technological advances we've been given, including a very generous donation from one of our church families to invest in updated equipment for Sunday morning worship services. Father's Day was celebrated as the first day congregants could participate in the morning worship service together, inside the sanctuary. We wore masks and face shields, and sat far apart from each other, with none of the familiar hugging, but many familiar smiling faces. Summertime worship services continued to change as the public health department and CDC provided new insight and advisories, such as indoor versus outdoor services, how to sing safely together, how to serve communion, and whether or not we should meet in person or worship from home.

September through November was a time of change (although for many, it may have felt like a continued blur from the previous months). Our family ministries director, Alexis Moore, resigned and Reverend Katherine Schoen was hired as our new Director of Student and Family Ministries.
